Since Father's Day is only a few short weeks away, you will be presenting him with a special gift, made entirely by you.




For our final online art lesson for the 2020 school year, you will be creating a unique Father's Day tie.


Materials:

 $8 \frac{1}{2} \times 11$ " plain white paper, pencil, eraser, ruler, black marker, a variety of colored markers, crayons or colored pencils.


Follow the steps below:



Begin by drawing a vertical line down the paper. Note the width of the tie should be about 5 inches.



Connect the dots with diagonal lines.



After cutting on the line, add 7 dots in same places you see mine.



Detail the entire inside space of the tie. Next, cut out tie shape and add color.

Things to think about:

- Draw all your lines, dots and detail lightly with pencil, then trace over with black marker.
- Be sure to hold the ruler steady when making your diagonal lines.
- For detail, think about what your Dad's hobbies are, favorite sports, favorite foods, where he works and so on.
- Make your cuts carefully and slowly.
- If putting words on your tie, make the letters look interesting but clearly readable.
- Add a lot of different colors to your tie.
- An adult may help you with some steps but <u>not</u> Dad. It's a surprise gift for him.
